Harry Amend is Vice-President of Haploos Consulting in Spokane, Washington, specializing in motivational and leadership coaching. He has 41 years of education, leadership, coaching, training and development experience at all levels of organizations. He worked as a school superintendent, leading school systems in the states of Washington, Montana and Idaho and is currently serving as interim principal at Freeman High School south of Spokane. Dale Kimmet is currently the Special Education School Improvement Unit Manager at the Office of Public Instruction (OPI) and has worked for the OPI for almost ten years. Prior to working at the OPI, Dale was a teacher, counselor, principal, superintendent, and coach at Terry Schools for twentyfour years.
